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




The Quest Chronicle. The story of the Shackleton-Rowett Expedition, Chojecki Jan, Goldcrest Books, 2022 First Limited Edition, 408pp, over 100 illustrations, hardback, New in dustwrapper. One of only 500 copies individually numbered and **signed** by Jan Chojecki.

In 1921, a converted Norwegian sealer, Quest, carried the legendary explorer Sir Ernest Shackleton on what turned out to be his last expedition. How did this scheme come to be almost completely financed by John Quiller Rowett. Why did the book of the expedition, Shackleton's Last Voyage published in 1923, name Frank Wild, as the author, when in fact it was written chiefly by the ship's surgeon, Dr Alexander Macklin? Why did the up and coming Australian adventurer, George Hubert Wilkins, choose to go with Shackleton on the Quest, instead of joining the expedition of the Canadian explorer Stefansson or making polar flights with Amundsen? Shackleton's Last Voyage did not tell the whole story. Then there are other puzzles to be resolved such as why the Quest's seaplane – which would have been a polar first – never flew. This account sets out the events that occurred before, during and after the voyage, told through the words of the protagonists with their letters, logs and diaries, many of which have not been previously published., **£38**.


Frank Wild was the only man to serve in the Antarctic under the British Empire's three greats, Scott, Shackleton and Mawson. This book is a chance to view Wild's role and accomplishments from his own writings, primarily his diary kept during the Southern Journey of Shackleton's BAE, his sledging diary from Mawson's Expedition, and his report to Mawson about the operations of AAE's Western Base, which he commanded in 1912-13. These have been quoted in other works but they have never been published before in their entirety., **£38**.

Unfortunately, he lost two fingers to frostbite on the journey, so was unable to participate in the sled ride to the Pole. Captain Cagni instead made the trip, reaching 86° 34' N, a new 'Farthest North' and, as the somewhat ungracious title of this book states, 'Farther North than Nansen', 74398, £695.*



Garwood, whose photographs illustrate this book. The text is a narrative of the explorations during 1897, when Conway and Garwood with two companions, ascended the Nordenskiold Glacier, proceeded by boat to King's Bay, from there they sledged and skied along King's Highway Glacier into the Pretender Pass - Osborne Glacier region, and eastward into James I Land. Returning to King's Bay they sailed southward to Horn Sound and climbed Hedgehog mountain to the east. Includes a chapter on skiing, and discussion of the nature of West Spitsbergen's glaciers. 

William Colbeck, who had sailed with Borchgrevink, and under Second Officer Edward Evans. Colbeck was going to write an account of the voyages but when this didn't happen Doorly undertook the effort. He produced not only a very interesting, pleasant and readable first hand account but also one of the scarcest books of Antarctic exploration. The book records the discovery of Scott Island and the first landing on Beaufort Island, and personal impressions of the Southern party upon their return., 68007, £625.*







His narrative covers the voyage south at great length, providing a fascinating picture of shipboard life. The Falkland Islands account is well detailed, and the Antarctic section of the narrative contains astute observations of the wildlife and sealing operations. 

Although he found the last link in the much sought after Northwest Passage Rae was never awarded a Knighthood, nor was he remembered at the time of his death. He was the only major explorer of the era not to receive a knighthood. Only recently has Rae's contribution to exploration*

On board the ship were Roald Amundsen, the future conqueror of the South Pole and Dr Frederick Cook, who had already explored much of the Arctic with Commander Robert Peary and who later claimed to be the first to reach the North Pole. Georges Lecointe was appointed first officer, and therefore was second in command, on board Belgica. He was also responsible for hydrography,

depth-soundings and charting. This was a multi-national expedition – Belgian, Norwegian, Polish, an American doctor and a Romanian zoologist. With such a diverse crew and almost a year stuck in the ice there were problems aplenty but all ended well largely due to four men, Amundsen, Cook, Lecointe and de Gerlache himself. Lecointe's book is perhaps the most readable of all accounts of the voyage of the Belgica and this is the first complete English translation of his 1904 book. From there, Shackleton and five crew made the epic voyage to South Georgia in the James Caird to ultimately arrange the rescue of the remaining crew. Orde Lees was selected originally as the motor expert but when this became redundant he became the storeman. He was responsible for maintaining and distributing supplies on the Endurance and on Elephant Island and naturally in this capacity he became an easy target for the bored and hungry. He was the only member of the expedition who maintained a personal daily diary of the voyage, from Day 1 to the day the rescued men left South America for England more than two years later. Lees was capable of appreciating and describing in touching and sensitive language a beautiful polar dawn or nature at its most inspiring. The diary has a rare dramatic quality and an eye and ear for the unusual and interesting.
